Former TLR Command Chief speaks about resilience

Team Little Rock hosted an event with guest speaker retired Chief Master Sgt. Anthony Brinkley, CEO of On The Brink Consulting, who spoke about the importance of resiliency to Airmen on base.

The visit from the former 314th and 19th Airlift Wing command chief – who spoke about topics such as being a part of a team, cutting out negativity, and expressing your feelings – was part of larger Resiliency Campaign Plan that 19th Airlift Wing leadership has initiated in order to promote resilience and build connectedness.

The discussion began with the importance of playing an active role in a team and why Airmen shouldn't take a single second for granted.

"That breath you just took — 7,000 other people didn't take," Brinkley said. "You still have something that you have to be a part of, but if you make it about you then you're going to have a problem."

Brinkley then discussed a topic called pruning — cutting out the things that do not provide happiness.

"Do you have people in your life that whenever you are around them, you feel less than?" Brinkley asked with a serious tone. "If you can't bring me peace, don't cost me peace. Don't give energy to something that diminishes your value."

Additionally, Brinkley moved on to discuss the importance of expressing

feelings, having the courage to get help, and unplugging the extra things in life.

"When you have all this stuff plugged into you and all of it is counting on you — what happens when you burn out?" Brinkley inquired. "Everything associated with you burns out. You don't have to be a chief to be stressed."

Brinkley made it clear that although what was discussed could be considered quite heavy — he was there for the Airmen.

"I will never question what you all do for the Air Force," Brinkley said. "What I will question is what you're doing for yourself."

Lastly, Chief Master Sgt. Justin Strain, 19th AW command chief, discussed how the talk affected him and grateful the wing was for Brinkley to come out as a key event in phase 1 of the RCP before the culmination at Oktoberfest on Oct. 4.

"One thing I've learned today is to make a difference in my own life," Strain said. "Anytime we bring somebody out, we hope they help at least one person, and we believe he has done just that."





LRAFB DDRP wins 2019 Red Ribbon Award

The 19th Airlift Wing Drug Demand Reduction Program won the 29th annual Secretary of Defense Community Drug Awareness Award, which is given to one installation in each military branch, making LRAFB the 2019 U.S. Air Force category winner.

The Red Ribbon Award highlights all the prevention efforts that have been made throughout the past year by the DDRP's joint service and multiagency coalition.

The installation's DDRP supports the 19th AW's mission by maintaining the health and wellness of a fit and ready fighting force, encouraging a drug-free Air Force community, and enforcing the Anti-Drug Abuse Act of 1988.

"We're very fortunate to be here at Little Rock Air Force Base because we have an amazing Community Action Board and team that make sure we can come together to not only hit one issue, but a variety of others," said Sharise Holland, DDRP program manager.

LRAFB's location in central Arkansas is in the High Interest Drug Threat Gulf Coast region, making it imperative for the DDRP to help foster a drug-free community.

Prevention efforts were extended to providing community outreach to both on and off-base populations targeting Department of Defense civilians, family members, retirees, and contractors.

The program delivers a variety of prevention efforts throughout the year, however during Red Ribbon week in October, the annual drug awareness campaign is in full force.

Last year the campaign was kicked-off by a 5K color run, where over 150 Airmen

Team Little Rock welcomed Arkansas community leaders for a mayors' tour on Sept. 24 to connect civic leaders with the base's mission sets and highlight readiness efforts.

Jacksonville and surrounding cities are home to many LRAFB members and provide a variety of support to Airmen and their families.

"Being a mayor I want to do whatever it takes to be a part of the base and lend my hand in this partnership," said Mayor Ken Kincade of Cabot.

The tour allowed civic leaders to engage on issues important to Team Little Rock and become more familiar with the base's singular focus on providing combat airlift capability for the Nation.

The mayors went through the C-130J Maintenance and Aircrew Training System simulators, where they got to experience a flying environment through a static simulation.

Then they toured Detachment 4, assigned to the 373rd Training Squadron. Det. 4 is responsible for training and supporting over 80 Active Duty, Guard, and Reserve C-130 units

worldwide, as well as maintainers from over 15 Allied nations.

"Little Rock Air Force Base has a lot of gems that I don't think a lot of people on the outside realize," said Kincade said. "The people are one of its biggest assets."

The day ended with a C-130 static tour and a visit to Camp Warlord -LRAFB's combat training facility, used to prepare Airmen for challenges they may face in aerospace expeditionary force deployments. There, the mayors were able to see a mission oriented protected posture demo for a visual example of promptness. Herk Nation Airment were able to display and discussed continuing readiness efforts that have led the way on

FAIRCHILD AIR FORCE BASE, Wash. – Air Mobility Command has dedicated the majority of September 2019 bringing together Airmen from across the globe for Exercise Mobility Guardian, the command's largest mobility exercise.

Nearly 30 Airmen from the 34th Combat Training Squadron at Little Rock Air Force Base, Arkansas, augmented a team of about 100 observers, coaches and trainers from different units to share their knowledge during the exercise deliberately developing Airmen to become joint-minded mobility leaders for the future Air Force.

"Exercises like this are going to provide a realistic environment for the service to get a true look at their capabilities," said U.S. Air Force Lt. Col. Thomas Joyner, 34th CTS commander. "If we are going to invest in exercises like this, we have to make sure we prioritize where we need to improve and

revamp for future training with our joint and international partners in order to execute tomorrows fight."

As part of the Advanced Operational Node Team, OCTs brought cargo commonly found downrange such as Humvees to prepare the exercise play area for loads not typically done at home station. Along with those provisions, they brought knowledge and experience needed to train Ready Warriors.

"The whole idea of this exercise is to bring people together, learn something new, make each Airmen stronger, find their weaknesses, capitalize on those while using your strengths, and pass them on to others," said U.S. Air Force Staff Sgt. Ryan O'Learly, 34th CTS mission support planner. "It's very important for Airmen to participate and create a ready force to compete, deter and ultimately win."

MG19 was designed for Airmen to fight as a Total

Force alongside joint and international partners. While exercising, the Airmen are being assessed by the OCTs so senior leadership can continue to better the simulated, contested environment to keep their competitive edge.

"We provide our feedback directly to the players in the form of end-of-phase briefs, and we provide it to AMC headquarters leadership," Joyner said. "There needs to be a formal mechanism that provides performance assessments back to senior leaders so they can then make decisions on training, investments, and skill priority for what we want to get after as a force."

When the exercise began phase III, about 281 assessments had been completed with many more to come. The 34th CTS along with OCTs from other units evaluate members during flights, aerial port procedures, air medical evacuations, contingency responses and maintenance operations.

As the moving parts of Mobility Guardian wind down, the OCTs step back to look at the importance of the exercise beyond the assessments and focus more on the opportunities and knowledge each Airman can take back to home station.



participated in the event and received promotional anti-drug products.

During RRW, the program also delivered direct prevention efforts to the community by educating three local schools about substance abuse and improper use.

"We're trying to hit early education, from preschool to fifth grade, where we can make a huge impact and let them know different options," Holland said.

These school visits had supporting members ranging from security forces, The Office of Special Investigations,

mental health, Alcohol and Drug Abuse Prevention and Treatment program managers, as well as outside agencies including the Jacksonville Police Department.

While DDRP is known for being in charge of drug testing personnel on base, they also visit squadrons to emphasize the importance of prevention.

"We provide other alternatives like education to our units and let them know their options, resources, as well as their value," Holland said. "We want to make sure we're mission-ready, and if there are drugs or substance abuse issues, we're not focused on the mission."

Holland will be attending the Red Ribbon Awards Ceremony to receive the Oct. 17 at the Pentagon in Arlington, Virginia.
