Black History Month proclamation

President Barack Obama

President of the United States

America's greatness is a testament to generations of courageous individuals who, in the face of uncomfortable truths, accepted that the work of perfecting our Nation is unending and strived to expand the reach of freedom to all. For too long, our most basic liberties had been denied to African Americans, and today, we pay tribute to countless good-hearted citizens -- along the Underground Railroad, aboard a bus

in Alabama, and all across our country
-- who stood up and sat in to help right the
wrongs of our past and extend the promise
of America to all our people. During
National African American History Month,
we recognize these champions of justice
and the sacrifices they made to bring us
to this point, we honor the contributions
of African Americans since our country's
beginning, and we recommit to reaching
for a day when no person is judged by
anything but the content of their character.

From the Revolutionary War through the abolitionist movement, to marches from Selma to Montgomery and across America today, African Americans have remained devoted to the proposition that all of us are created equal, even when their own rights were denied. As we rejoice in the victories won by men and women who believed in the idea of a just and fair America, we remember that, throughout history, our success has been driven by bold individuals who were willing to speak out and change the status quo.

Refusing to accept our Nation's original sin, African Americans bound by the chains

of slavery broke free and headed North, and many others who knew slavery was antithetical to our country's conception of human rights and dignity fought to bring their moral imagination to life. When Jim Crow mocked the advances made by the 13th Amendment, a new generation of men and women galvanized and organized with the same force of faith as their enslaved ancestors. Our Nation's young people still echo the call for equality, bringing attention to disparities that continue to plague our society in ways that mirror the non-violent tactics of the civil rights movement while adapting to modern times. Let us also not forget those who made the ultimate sacrifice so that we could make our voices heard by exercising our right to vote. Even in the face of legal challenges,

every eligible voter should not take for granted what is our right to shape our democracy.

We have made great progress on the journey toward ensuring our ideals ring true for all people. Today, African American high school graduation and college enrollment rates are at an all-time high. The African-American unemployment rate has been halved since its Great Recession peak. More than 2 million African Americans gained health insurance thanks to the Affordable Care Act. The incarceration rates for African-American men and women fell during each year of this

Administration and are at their lowest points in over two decades. Yet challenges persist and obstacles still stand in the way of becoming the country envisioned at our founding, and we would do a disservice to all who came before us if we remained blind to the way past injustices shape the present. The United States is home to 5 percent of the world's population, but 25 percent of the world's prisoners -- a disproportionate number of whom are African American -- so we must find ways to reform our criminal justice system and ensure that it is fairer and more effective. While we've seen unemployment rates decrease, many communities, particularly those of color, continue to experience significant gaps in educational and employment opportunities, causing too many young men and women to feel like no matter how hard they try, they may never achieve their dreams.

Our responsibility as citizens is to address the inequalities and injustices that linger, and we must secure our birthright freedoms for all people. As we mark the 40th year of National African American

History Month, let us reflect on the sacrifices and contributions made by generations of African Americans, and let us resolve to continue our march toward a day when every person knows the unalienable rights to life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness.






As Lachmund Drive reopens, it's important to recognize the man to whom it was named. Major Roy E. Lachmund was the Little Rock Air Force Base's Purchasing and Contracting Officer in 1955, and (along with Colonel Joseph Thomas-the first Installation Commander) was among the first Airmen to lose his life while in service to the Little Rock AFB. A memorial (to which Col Thomas and Maj Lachmund's names are engraved) stands in Memorial Park to commemorate all the Airmen who have fallen while assigned to Little Rock AFB. The memorial was dedicated on October 11th, 1980.

LRAFB facilitates ride-sharing service options

With busy roads, packed parking lots and the need for a designated driver after a night out, it's no wonder why ride-sharing services are growing more popular with young adults in the United States each day. Little Rock Air Force Base residents are no exception.

A growing number of companies provide taxi-like services and connect passengers to drivers via smart phone apps. Rides can be arranged in advance or often on short notice.

Opening Little Rock AFB to ride-sharing improves the quality of life for Airmen, especially those without vehicles.

"We want to make sure that it is known that the use of ride-sharing services is an option on the base," said Maj. Gregory Bodenstein, 19th Security Forces Squadron commander. "Once the ride-sharing driver meets our requirements, moving on and off the installation will be seamless."

For those new to the concept of ride-sharing, when a ride is requested, riders use a smartphone to contact nearby available drivers. When a driver



in the company's system accepts the ride, the customer can see their profile, which includes a name, headshot, make and model of their car, a photo of the car and the approximate time of arrival. Drivers then often call or text the requester when they arrive and customers hop in.

Reputable ridesharing companies require their drivers to undergo screen-

ing processes. Currently, Uber is the main alternative to standard taxi services in the Little Rock area. Arkansas Uber drivers must pass a background check, driving history check and ongoing quality controls.

Just like any visitor to the base, ride-share drivers must still provide a valid state driver's license, proof of insurance and vehicle registration. Security Forces will then conduct an identity and background check.

Once the background check is completed, drivers have three ways obtain a pass to access the installation, according to Jeffery Bardsley, 19th Security Force Squadron plans and programs section chief.

- 1. Service members must come to the visitor center with their military ID to sponsor drivers in order to obtain a pass to access the base one time.
- 2. Service members can e-mail the Little Rock AFB Visitor Center from their military e-mail address instead of meeting the drivers at the visitor center building to obtain a pass to access the base one time.
- 3. Or, ride-share drivers can obtain a long-term pass good for up to one year. In order to qualify for a long-term pass, ride-share drivers must present proof of their employment by a ride-sharing service. If interested in a long-term pass, ride share drivers should call the 19th Security Forces Squadron Pass and Registration Section at (501)987-6338.





Military Saves promotes readiness, fiscal fitness

Those bummed out over missing on the billion dollar jackpot still have an opportunity to earn a plum prize.

Military Saves Week, an annual DOD-wide event focused on motivating and inspiring military members and their families to be financially aware, is set for February 22 to February 26.

The Airman and Family Readiness Center will host a number of events for Team Little Rock members to cash-in on the habit of saving money.

"It's going to be fun," said Rick Tomaskovic, a Community Readiness Consultant at the A&FRC.

The campaign will kick off with Team Little Rocks members filling out an online survey projected to be available February 10 until February 17. The squadron competition measures the fiscal intelligence of each member.

"The survey determines the financial IQ of each squadron, and no one wants to be last," said Sharon Thompson, chief of the A&FRC, who added that after the survey, squadrons will pick teams of four to compete in the competition, a Financial Literacy Tournament during Military Saves Week.

Thompson and Tomaskovic said it's important to see saving money as more than buttoned-up and boring charts and spreadsheets, they want people to know there is a fun side of finance.

Besides the competition, financial classes and practical

information will be offered throughout the week.

Tomaskovic said that money is never boring, and to support his claim, an information fair will be held daily in the lobby from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. of the Walters Community Support Center, where representatives from various financial institutions and programs will be offering free financial information to military members and their families.

In addition, Team Little Rock members will have an opportunity to go online and take a pledge that states their

savings goals in 2016.

"Every day, there are people on this base who cannot pay their rent, cannot buy for themselves or their families. They are good people; they are people that are going to work every day, and doing everything they're supposed to do," said Thompson. "But they don't know about developing a budget or a spending plan; they don't know how to make their money work for them."

The goal is to teach people better financial habits so that saving money becomes more than a one-time thing.

"Fifty-five percent of people don't save for anything. They just kind of live pay-day to pay-day; that's a lot of things to not have planned for. Basically, the Military Saves Campaign is just about trying to create financial awareness," said Tomaskovic, who added that this approach is the key to turning this dire financial situation around, yielding benefits for every week of the year.

The A&FRC staff hopes to make a lasting difference in the financial lives of military members and their families through the Military Saves Campaign.

"That's why this campaign is so huge: It teaches people how to be successful; how to get what they want," said Thompson. "Education is the key."




LRAFB kicks off tax season

Tax season is upon us and there are many free tax assistance sources available for Team Little Rock Airmen.

Military OneSource provides free access to secure online tax preparation software, in addition to free financial counseling and free tax consultations. All active-duty, National Guard, and reserve service members (regardless of activation status), their families, and survivors have access to this service, which is designed to be user-friendly and simple. It can be accessed from any computer with an internet connection, with no need for a Controlled Access Card reader. For those without computers, the base library has several computers designated solely for Military OneSource tax preparation, complete with privacy screens to ensure all information stays confidential.

Nervous about filing your own taxes? Not only can you call the Military OneSource number for tax help, but your access to H&R Block's software allows you to contact their tax specialists. There is online chat support available 24/7 during tax season, or you can call them Monday-Friday from 7 a.m. - midnight and Saturday-Sunday from 7 a.m. - 8 p.m.. for this service, visit http://militaryonesource.mil/Taxes.

The IRS itself offers free federal filing to all taxpayers, regardless of military status, whose income falls below \$62,000. Although this is mainly for your federal taxes only, state returns are available, and some of those are free as well. Those who are eligible for the IRS's free filing may visit https://www.irs.gov/ uac/Free-File:-Do-Your-Federal-Taxesfor-Free to get started.

There are also a number of private companies that offer free online tax preparation, along with phone and chat support, for military members or, at the very least, a military discount on their software. Do your research!

For those who still are not comfortable using the free, do-it-yourself software, the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance program or Tax Counseling for the Elderly program may be of assistance to you. VITA sites offer free tax preparation to any taxpayer, regardless of military status, whose income falls under \$54,000 (whether filing joint or single). Remember that "income" only refers to your taxable income (i.e., your base pay), not your

BAH or BAS, so this service will be open to nearly all enlisted members and some company grade officers. Tax Counseling for the Elderly is a partnership between the IRS and the AARP which provides free tax preparation and consultation services for low- to moderate-income filers, with a target clientele aged 60 and above. For more information on the VITA and TCE programs, and for a VITA/TCE site locator, you can visit https://www. irs.gov/Individuals/Free-Tax-Return-Preparation-for-You-by-Volunteers.

The base Tax Center opens its doors March 1 in the base legal office (located on the second floor of the 19 AW Headquarters, Bldg. 1250) and will be open through April 18, which is the filing deadline. Services will be available to all active-duty enlisted personnel with less than 2 years of service. The Airmen who fit eligibility requirements will be able to drop off their documents during business hours, and they will return later for an

appointment with one of the Tax Center volunteers to have their returns prepared and filed.

Tax Center volunteers are certified to do only basic tax returns. The Tax Center volunteers will not be able to assist if you own a personal business (with the exception of a home daycare business which services military dependents), rental properties, or an extensive stock portfolio.

Many tax documents can be found at https://mypay. dfas.mil/mypay.aspx such as the new IRS Form 1095. For 2015, taxpayers are required to prove that they have obtained the minimum essential coverage, TRICARE qualifies for this coverage. Military members' proof of coverage is the Department of Treasury Internal Revenue Service Form 1095: Employer Provided Health Insurance Offer and Coverage. Each member of our Air Force team will need to have the IRS Form 1095 to file their taxes in 2016.


The base Finance office cannot provide any tax

Items needed to file tax return

The following required documents must be brought to a tax center appointment:

- (1) Military ID card;
- (2) Routing number and bank account number for E-filing;
- (3) Social Security cards and birth dates of all taxpayers and dependents;
- (4) All W-2s, 1099, 1095, and investment income paperwork;
 - (5) Previous year's tax returns;
- (6) Powers of attorney if necessary and deployment orders;
- (7) Form 8332 for divorced or separated parents; and
- (8) Other documents Any records you keep that will help substantiate the deductions you'll claim on your return. You'll need this documentation should the IRS later select your return for examination. Normally, tax records should be kept for three years, but some documents, such as records relating to a home purchase or sale, stock transactions, IRA and business or rental property, should be kept longer.





913th AG flies final legacy C-130 mission

The final C-130H model mission for the 913th Airlift Group, Air Force Reserve, was flown from Little Rock Air Force Base, Ark., Jan. 28, 2016, with a C-130H aircrew comprised of both active-duty and Reserve personnel, reflecting the active association the 913th AG has maintained with the 19th Air Wing's 50th Airlift Squadron.

From its modest beginnings in October 2010, as a 22nd Air Force Detachment One, the 913th AG has grown from two Airmen, to more than 800. The group's personnel flew, maintained and supported the Air Force mission in 14 C-130H Hercules out of Little Rock Air Force Base, Ark. But no more.

"This flight means the mission for the 913th has officially changed from the "H" to the "J" model," said Lt. Col. Keith Jasmin, chief of current operations for the 913th Operations Support Squadron. "We've been balancing both, but now, we transition to the J."

The mission, which was a "standard training sortie" according to Jasmin, lasted about two hours and flew along

the "White River Tour," concentrating on low level air drop techniques and pilot proficiency training.

Many active and Reserve C-130H aircraft are being replaced by the C-130J Super Hercules, a comprehensive updated version with new engines, flight deck and

other systems, all designed to improve performance and save money.

"There's a big difference between the "H" and the "J" models," said Master Sgt. Josh Burton, Standardization/Evaluation loadmaster, 327th Airlift Squadron. "The "J" is mostly computers, and almost

all automated, where the legacy, or "H," is all hands-on."

The 913th AG still has two C-130H aircraft that are being prepared for transfer to other locations. Meanwhile, training for 913th AG personnel transitioning to the "J" model continues at the only formal training school for the "J" model, here at Little Rock AFB.

The transition to the "J" model requires maintainers, pilots, and loadmasters to complete conversion training. The formal schooling process should be completed by September 2016, but aircrews will continue to gain experience and proficiency for about another 18 months.

Due to all of these changes, the 913th AG will no longer be designated an "active association," with their own Reserve aircraft, but a "classic association," where they'll work side by side with active duty Airmen on their aircraft.

Approximately 55 maintainers from the 50th Maintenance Squadron, who supported the active association, have already been moved back to the 19th Maintenance Group.

The 913th AG will be the first C-130J model classic association in the Air Force.

High year of tenure extension for 122 specialties

JOINT BASE SAN ANTONIO-RANDOLPH, Texas (AFNS) -- Eligible senior airmen, staff sergeants, technical sergeants, and master sergeants in 122 Air Force specialties can apply for a high year of tenure extension and, if approved, will be able to extend between 12 and 24 months past their current HYT.

Eligible Airmen who apply for an extension should be approved by their unit commander or civilian leader, and should meet regular re-enlistment criteria as well. Airmen with a re-enlistment restriction are not eligible to apply for an HYT extension.

The HYT extension application window will be open Feb. 1, 2016, through May 31, 2017.

Eligible Airmen with a current HYT in February 2016 should apply as soon as possible to obtain approval prior to their current HYT. Eligible Airmen with a current HYT March 1-May 31, 2016, should apply at least 30 days prior to their current HYT. All other eligible Airmen

should submit their requests for extension at least 120 days prior to their current HYT.

Eligibility is limited to specific control Air Force specialty codes and grades as of Jan. 26, 2016, but the following Airmen may also apply:

- Airmen who previously held an eligible AFSC, who are projected to return to the eligible AFSC on or before Sept. 30, 2017, and who have a current HYT between Feb. 1, 2016, and Sept. 30, 2017, may apply. Airmen in this category should provide documentation showing their projected return date with their HYT extension request.

- Airmen who are in a special duty or developmental special duty assignment, who have an eligible AFSC, and who have an assignment availability code or date eligible for return from overseas date that expires on or before Sept. 30, 2017, may apply. Airmen in this category should provide documentation of the eligible AFSC with

their HYT extension request. DEROS and AAC curtailment requests will not be approved for this program.

Airmen approved for an extension should get required retainability within 10 days of being notified or they will forfeit the opportunity for an HYT extension.

February is Teen Dating Violence Awareness Month

Learning to build healthy dating relationships is an important part of being a teenager. Parents play a key role in helping teenagers understand what is healthy - and what isn't - in their relationships with peers.

The Family Advocacy Program on Little Rock Air Force Base encourages and promotes healthy relationships between families and their teen children.

Family Advocacy and the Youth Center will team up for a 90-minute program Feb. 25 at 4:30 p.m. related to bullying, teen violence and how teens can protect themselves if they ever should find themselves in an abusive relationship. Call the Youth Center at 987-2749 to register.

Talking with teenagers about dating relationships may seem like a real challenge. Keep in mind that your experience is a great resource for your teen.

"It's not always easy, but with a little bit of a conscious effort, you and your teen can have a vibrant, open relationship where consistent communication can actually help reduce the fear of the teen dating violence issue," said Lisa Dicus, LCSW, 19th Medical Operations Group Family Advocacy Officer.

Here are a few tips to get you started:

Model good relationships. Teens notice when you're respectful in your relationships at home. Show your teen that communicating in a positive way helps build trust and respect. This is one of the most significant ways that teens learn about healthy relationships.

Talk with your teen about relationships they see on television or at school. Use these opportunities to talk about what's healthy and what's unhealthy in a relation-



ship. Talk with your teenager about the importance of being respected - and respectful - in a relationship.

Teach your teen that abusive behavior is not okay. Your teen should be concerned about anyone who is disrespectful, threatening or demeaning. Bullying is not okay!

Keep the conversation casual. Let your teen ask questions and guide the discussion. Your teen may be more willing to talk if you do it on their terms.

Learn about digital abuse. This can include excessive texting, sending intimidating texts or emails, and using social media sites to post threats or insults. Talk with your teen about using social medial responsibly. You may also consider monitoring your teenager's use of social media sites as a way to help keep them safe.

Talk with your teenager about the importance of trust and relationship boundaries. Let your teenager know that privacy is important, and they should be concerned about someone who wants to share passwords or constantly check their phone or email accounts.

Remember that relationships don't have to be violent

to be abusive. Talk with your teenager about recognizing the warning signs of an abusive relationship, including when someone is overly jealous, is demeaning or wants to isolate your teen from family and friends. Remember, love shouldn't hurt in any way, shape or form.

Keep the lines of communication open. Be sure your teenager knows that you are available to talk with them at any time without judgment or anger. Sometimes teens won't tell things out of fear of getting into trouble.

If you believe your teen is in an unhealthy relationship, your support can be vital in helping them get through this tough time. Teenagers, like others in abusive relationships, often believe their abuser will get better over time. Unfortunately, abusive behavior often becomes more violent if the relationship continues in the same pattern. If your teen comes to you for help in a relationship, take the conversation seriously. Help your teen make a plan to keep safe and get help, if necessary.

"Eighty one percent of parents believe teen dating violence is not an issue or admit they don't even know if it is an issue with their teens," said Dicus.

Help is available for teenagers through Family Advocacy at 987-7377 or with trained peer advocates at the National Domestic Violence Hotline at 1-800-799-7233 who are available by phone or by online chat. You may also want to contact a Military OneSource consultant at 1-800-342-9647 who can refer you to someone who can help.

AF Selective Re-enlistment Bonus program list triples

WASHINGTON (AFNS) -- Air Force officials released details on the fiscal year 2016 Selective Re-enlistment Bonus program Feb. 1. This year's program, consisting of 117 Air Force specialties eligible to receive bonuses, is a substantial increase from the previous year's program where 40 Air Force specialty codes were eligible.

The program's expansion coincides with Air Force plans to grow the force to meet mission demands in the face of changing geopolitical situations, and to address key gaps in nuclear, maintenance, cyber, intelligence, remotely piloted aircraft and support career fields through fiscal 2017.

According to Col. Robert Romer, the chief of military force policy for the Air Force, the criteria used to determine career fields eligible for re-enlistment bonuses includes current and projected manning levels, re-enlistment trends, career field force structure

WASHINGTON (AFNS) -- Air Force officials released changes, career field stress levels, and the cost levels associated with training new Airmen.

"This year's SRB list increased by nearly threefold as we focused on retaining key experience while continuing our deliberate plan to grow our force," Romer said. "We are increasing our accessions and training pipeline to support the increased growth, but these new enlistees won't be seasoned for some time. Retaining the experience we have is critical to our success in reaching target end strength."

All AFSC bonus changes are effective Feb. 1, 2016.



2015 tax requirements

Effective for tax year 2015 is another form in MyPay under Taxes, the IRS Form 1095. The Affordable Care Act signed into law March 23, 2010, requires all U.S. citizens and legal residents to obtain and maintain a minimum standard of health care insurance. For 2015, taxpayers are required to prove that they have obtained the minimum essential coverage, TRICARE qualifies for this coverage. Proof of coverage is the Department of Treasury Internal Revenue Service Form 1095: Employer Provided Health Insurance Offer and Coverage. Active duty, Air National Guard, Air Force Reserve, retiree and civilians will need to have the IRS Form 1095 to file their 2015 taxes.
