

Association of Defense Communities visits TLR community

Representatives from the Association of Defense Communities visited Little Rock Air Force Base, Arkansas, on Feb. 25-26, 2020, in recognition of Central Arkansas being one of five communities across the country named to the 2020 Class of Great American Defense Communities.

The program, now in its fifth year, was established to recognize the role that communities and regions with active installations play in supporting service members and military families.

"The strength of our military starts at home, in America's defense communities," said Joe Driskill, ADC president.

During the visit, the representatives were able to tour Jacksonville High School and learn about the Cyber Security program. The new program was established in partnership with the 189th Airlift Wing, and is currently supported by the Guard's Cyber School.

"The cyber security program at Jacksonville High School is just one of the many reasons Central Arkansas was recognized as a 2020 Great American Defense Community," said Grace Marvin, ADC director of communications. "The strength of the installation/community relationship is apparent in the numerous quality of life initiatives that both the region and the base are committed to maintaining."

They were also able to sit in with base leadership, discussing the successful passage of state legislation to benefit our military and retiree community, including the exemption of military retirees from paying state income tax, automatic licensure for military spouses and veterans coming in from other states, and exempting all Arkansas National Guard members from tuition for higher education opportunities, among many other programs.

"The ADC brings together groups like this around the country to celebrate the good things that happen so we can learn from one another and make sure those practices are deployed all around the


country," Driskill said.



Mobility Airmen complete Agile Combat Employment experiment

MARINE CORPS AIR STATION FUTENMA, Japan – Airmen from Dyess Air Force Base, Texas, Little Rock AFB, Arkansas, and Kadena Air Base, Japan, completed an Agile Combat Employment experiment at Marine Corps Air Station Futenma, Japan, Feb. 20, 2020.

The training helped develop and improve an Air Force's ability to rapidly deploy F-15 Eagle aircraft, personnel and equipment to austere locations throughout the world in support of Air Force and Combatant Command strategic objectives.

"For the past two decades, C-130 type aircraft have been completing missions in the Middle East and Africa in order for us to remain relevant in potential armed conflicts in the future, we have to be able to adjust with the way our adversaries are adjusting," said Maj. Michael Mayor, 317th

Airlift Wing inspector general. "We have to be able to continuously adjust as we move forward as a military, as we continue to change the way we do business, posture ourselves and continue to evolve with the combat Air Force."

During the training, three C-130J Super Hercules aircraft from the 317th Airlift Wing from Dyess AFB and 19th Airlift Wing from Little Rock AFB transported personnel and equipment needed to successfully maintain and support flying operations for four F-15 Eagle aircraft. Marines from MCAS Futenma provided fuel support for the aircraft in order to help complete the mission.

"This training helps us become more efficient at moving to various airfields throughout the world, then setting up equipment for other aircraft to land, arm up and launch before anyone is able to identify that we were using that location," Mayor said.

The Airmen also practiced a hybrid

Airmen concept. This helped the Airmen become more well-rounded by learning how to accomplish overarching mission objectives while helping Airmen in other career fields complete their tasks. The concept is designed to minimize the amount of personnel needed to provide support for potential ACE missions.

By using the hybrid Airmen concept during ACE, Airmen were provided with cross utilization training that enabled them to more effectively service the aircraft, perform navigation type functions and provide aircraft security.

"This has helped us see how we can constantly improve our skill sets for future missions," said Capt. Lacey Koelling, 317th Aircraft Maintenance Squadron maintenance operations officer. "This enables us to provide rapid, mobile and agile response force, because we are able to have less personnel while being a full encompassing team."

The exercise would not have been as

successful without maintenance Airmen providing continuous upkeep to ensure the aircraft can fly.

"It's important for maintainers to think through these fast situations so they can work safely and efficiently so we can move rapidly around the world at a moment's notice," Koelling said. "This experiment is showcasing that we can adapt to complete any type of scenario."

This training enabled C-13oJ Super Hercules aircrews from Dyess and Little Rock and F-15E aircrews from Kadena to exchange knowledge, help all of the Airmen become a more cohesive team and posture the F-15E members for agile combat employment.

"We bring a lot of logistics experience to the fight, which helps us effectively relocate our forces and equipment when called upon," Mayor said. "This experiment helped us train and improve Airmen's skill sets that will enable us to complete any mission that comes our way."





THIS WEEK IN HISTORY

■ 1942 – The U.S. Army Air School at Tuskegee, Alabama, created for black aviators, graduated its first class. The five black military pilots included Capt. Benjamin O. Davis, who became a General and the commander of the Tuskegee Airmen. In 1998, he was promoted to four star General by President Clinton.

■ 1944 – Operation Thursday. Through 11 March, Allied aircraft and gliders airlifted Brig. Gen. Orde C. Wingate's Special Force with 9,000 personnel and 1,400 mules and horses from India at night to a location 200 miles behind enemy lines in Burma. In a unique technique, P-51 pilots cut Japanese telephone lines by attaching a weighted cable to the aircraft. This hung down like a pendulum and cut the lines as the aircraft flew over. In another, not-recommended instance, the pilot flew through the wires and broke them with his airplane.

■ 1965 – Operation Rolling Thunder begins with more than 100 United States Air Force jet bombers striking an ammunition depot at Xom Bang, 10 miles inside North Vietnam.

■ 2002 – Operation Enduring Freedom. During Operation Anaconda, the USAF experienced its first combat deaths since the 1991 Gulf War. Two Airmen, MSgt. John

Chapman and Sr.A Jason Cunningham, died in helicopter assaults near Gardez, Afghanistan. During the same battle, a Kentucky Air National Guard pararescue specialist from the 123rd Special Tactics Squadron, Tech. Sgt. Keary Miller, cared for wounded troops and participated in a 15-hour firefight with nearby enemy forces after his Army special operations helicopter crashed on Taku Ghar Mountain in eastern Afghanistan. For his heroism, Miller received the Silver Star, the nation's third highest award for valor.


