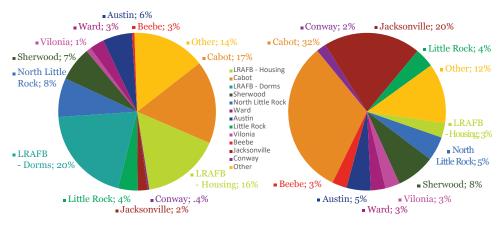
Community Support:
